Radioactive Wales


ND Cymru received plenty of press coverage during its work to highlight the increasing dangers of radioactivity in Wales. Many thanks to our friends in Newport (Pembrokeshire) CND, Fishguard CND, Cardigan Friends of the Earth, Gillian and Tom Metcalf, Lampeter, and Nan Morgan in North Wales who helped to leaflet and alert residents and visitors to the dangers. A giant postcard signed by well over 200 visitors to the CND Cymru tent at the National Eisteddfod in Glyn Nedd, was handed in to John Redwood at the Welsh Office by Vice Chairperson Ray Davies, and supporters from South Wales, on 22 September.

- As poor Julian was suddenly taken ill, the Walk for a Nuclear Free Irish Sea did not take place. Military low level flying

ilary Lofmark is researching noise pollution produced from low flying military aircraft, and the regulations that apply to their use. She is based at Lampeter. Parts of Mid Wales have recently "enjoyed" the unnerving presence of low flying helicopters and harrier military jets in the sky simultaneously. Apparently, the helicopters are pointing out the targets to the jets. It leaves the person on the



ground, feeling very much like the target, or the witness to some near accident. It is outrageous.

Trident

MS Vanguard has arrived on the Clyde carrying 16 Trident missiles, which had been loaded in the United States. It was greeted by protest. The 100 year old peace boat, Puffin, sailed alongside the submarine flying a Christian CND sail.

As Vanguard was about to berth 6 people from Faslane Peace Camp rushed into the North gate of Faslane. The "bandit" alarm was set off, all gates were closed and the base was closed down for over an hour.

ACTION

The vast Trident Submarine complex on the Clyde has overspent its budget by £800 million, more than 70% above its original estimate. The National Audit Office has accused the MOD of allowing costs to escalate out of control.

A report just produced by the House of Commons Select Committee on Defence admits that Trident breaks Article 6 of the Nuclear Non Proliferation Treaty, which commits Britain to getting rid of its nuclear weapons. While the Government claims that Trident is a minimum deterrent, the report states: "Trident's accuracy and sophistication. . . does — and was always intended to represent a significant enhancement of the UK's nuclear capability. We have invested a great deal of money to make it possible to attack more targets with greater effectiveness using nominally equivalent explosive power."

ACTION:

Write again to your MP ask her/him what is the purpose of Trident. Quote the Select Committee and ask about Britain not complying with Article 6 of the NPT. If possible, please send copies of the reply you receive to Jill Stallard.

Trawsfynydd

Well done CADNO, WANA, CND Cymru and the people of North Wales! In August it was announced that the incinerators, built to burn 'low level' radioactive waste, were not to be commissioned, but that the radioactive waste was to be transported to Hinkley

CND Cymru works for international peace and disarmament and a world in which the vast resources now devoted to militarism are redirected to the real needs of the human community

Point nuclear power station in Somerset to be incinerated. Nuclear Electric have applied to the Welsh Office to transport the material by road. So, Wales will be exporting its nuclear waste to England. The approval process is expected to take 6 to 12 months. There is still work to be done.

IL ACTION

The transporting of the waste means that it will have to be handled even more, creating more volume of waste. It is dangerous to transport any radioactive material, and it is monstrous that the radioactivity will be dispelled all over the people and environment of England and South Wales, and the Bristol Channel.

If you live in South Wales, write to your local paper and tell them. John Redwood should be asked questions about this and it should be impressed upon the Welsh Office that welsh people do not want this to happen. It was once thought, wishfully, that the winds and water would spread the toxic radioactivity so that no individual creature could receive a 'harmful' dose. It is now known that there is no threshold, and the same number of illnesses and deaths will occur if the material is diluted or not. The difference is that the effects are spread over a large population and it's more difficult to trace the health damage back to the polluter.

Decommissioning Trawsfynydd

efuelling has speeded up as Nuclear Electric has been given permission by the Nuclear Installations Inspectorate to increase the number of elements in each flask. During the railstrikes trains with nuclear flasks were spotted in sidings at Llandudno, and rolling through Chester station.

At the Local Community Liason Council Meeting on 22 September Nuclear Electric announced that it favours the dry store option of decommissioning methods. This comes as no surprise.

The method has to be approved by the Government. Watch this space.



Hiroshima

There were many events remembering Hiroshima and Nagasaki. At the National Eisteddfod, Cymdeithas y Cymod and CND Cymru joined together to remember all the victims of nuclear war and the preparation for it – from uranium miners and their families, victims of nuclear testing sites, installations and waste "disposal".

Llandrindod CND and the Mayor of Llandrindod, planted a tree.

Newport CND (Pembrokeshire) floated candles across the estuary from the iron bridge.

Ystradgynlais CND held a very moving service in the park, and flowers were laid on the Japanese Peace Monument which reads "May Peace Prevail on Earth".

L ACTION

Next year will be the 50th anniversary of the first dropping of nuclear bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki. Start planning your event now, as it is likely to attract media interest.



Nuclear Non Proliferation Talks (NPT)

s the preparation for the talks which begin in April 1995, gets underway, the discussion is warming up. At the preparatory talks in September, Australia called for a UN Security Resolution banning the use or threat of use of nuclear weapons to be made binding on all states.

The Liberal Democrat Party Conference called for a limited extension of the NPT to be linked to progress on a worldwide convention to eliminate all nuclear weapons. (Sadly, the Conference felt unable to support the scrapping of Trident as a contribution to non-proliferation.)

ACTION

Copies of CND's Blueprint for a Nuclear Weapon Free World which includes an idea for 12 key steps for world wide nuclear disarmament, please contact Jill Stallard.

To Sellafield – radioactive nitric acid – from the

is poised to sign a contract to import 183,000 gallons of nitric acid contaminated with uranium from Hanford, a disused nuclear weapon plant in the US. The americans have a huge nuclear waste problem and are now to start transporting it across the world to dump it in Britain. BNFL say that it is not waste but "industrial recycling material". Any waste from the US will be transported by sea. Simply handling the waste will increase the amounts of radioactivity in the environment, a once only Braer - like disaster in the Atlantic or the Irish Sea would never be cleaned up.

ACTION

Write and questions about this, to your MP, the PM, Secretary of State for the Environment, your County Emergency Planning Officer. Make a fuss.

Wylfa nuclear power station

uclear Electric is once again to prosecuted under Health and Safety laws after a discharge a year last July. In the first court case NE was fined £34,000 after admitting offences brought by the Inspectorate of Pollution. The action this time, by the Health and Safety Executive, relates to the alleged failure of equipment and the operation of the reactor.

There has been yet another failure of fuel loading equipment, since the May incident reported in the previous edition of Heddwch.

LACTION

Lobbying your MP, especially if you live in North Wales, Merseyside or Ireland, would help put the truth about nuclear power on the agenda, at a time when the nuclear industry is very vunerable to such facts. Talking about these incidents, writing letters to the press and your elected representatives will keep thee issues out in the open.



ost of us would consider that we are living in "peace time" yet the authors of this book would disagree.



Visiting Northern Ireland, September 1994

ia Rhosier is General Secretary of the Fellowship of Reconciliation in Wales. This year the organisation celebrated its 75th anniversary at a meeting in Northern Ireland.

"Corrymeela (Hill of Harmony), is people of all ages and Christian Traditions who, individually, and together, are committed to the healing of social, religious and political divisions that exist in Northern Ireland and throughout the world" — so says the plaque at the entrance of this peaceful place on the North East Antrim coast, the place where 95 of the members of the four UK branches of the Fellowship of the Fellowship of Reconciliation met over the weekend of 9-11 September to celebrate the 75th anniversary of the founding of the International Fellowship of Reconciliation, and share insights, hopes and concerns.

What a privilege to be in Northern Ireland at this historic time! Excitement, a touch of euphoria even, tinged our greetings as we met, and were welcomed by our friends and fellow reconcilers in the Northern Ireland branch! But it was soon "down to business" as we earnestly questioned them about their feelings and opinions about the IRA ceasefire. "Cautious Optimism" perhaps best describes the general atmosphere among both catholics and protestants present. We were acutely aware that we were among people who had been working for peace and reconciliation for many years, some for all of the 25 years of "the troubles". Were they about to see their dream come true? All were agreed on the need to show trust and to reach out in love to those attempting to find a political solution, but long years of disappointment over broken promises in the past and an apprehension about loyalist violence increasing also materialised. We felt sure, however, that despite any misgivings, these brave people would continue their peacemaking efforts, using all their contacts with those in power and their own considerable resources to restore normality and hope in the community, and walk together towards a brighter future.

Ceasefire – A Belfast perspective

o there is a "complete" cessation of violence by one of the four main paramilitary groups in Northern Ireland. But why are celebrations only taking place among those involved in the ceasefire? Have they won? Was there a deal? These are questions that trouble the mind in the fitful truce we now experience, a truce punctuated by violence from the three other paramilitary groups and nuisance firecrackers from the kids on the streets preparing for Halloween.

All transactions from war to non-violent politics are like this uncertain, messy and with potential for flare up and disappointment. But it does feel as if the beginning of a new phase is dawning; a little less tension in the main streets perhaps, though still plenty in the areas where the gun is held ready for action.

Only time will tell whether the ceasfire is universal and permanent. At present it is complete for the IRA alone. We must pray it will hold for all and become witnessed by a laying up of arms. This will take time.

And if it happens it will bring new problems. How do we manage peace? What do the former paramilitary people once writ large in their violent world do in peacetime? Where does the anger and the grief of the thousands of victims find acknowledgement and justice?

This is our Gethsemane here in Belfast. We only watch and pray.

Campaign Against the Arms Trade

Clean Investment Campaign

ocal Authorities and Health
Authorities in Wales are investing
pension funds in companies which are
involved in military industry. The Clean
Investment Campaign is setting out to
contact these authorities and ask them to
use their influence as shareholders in
military companies to convert to civil
production. In practice, many of those
active in this campaign have been pressing
their local authorities to sell their shares in
military industry. A recent newsletter from
the Campaign Against the Arms Trade

listed the following Health Authorities as having shares in GEC and/or Lucas: West Glamorgan, South Glamorgan and Mid Glamorgan. Dyfed and West Glamorgan County Councils also have shares in these two companies. GEC is Britain's largest arms manufacturer, Lucas manufacture systems and equipment for fighting vehicles, guided weapons etc. Both these companies deal in perfecting the art of injury to anyone 90 seconds to 90 years old, so it seems particularly ironic that Local Health Authorities, both caring for people, should have anything to do with them and their dirty business.

IL ACTION

If you live in any of the areas mentioned above, contact your local councillor and let them know, find out how they feel about it, ask them if they will do something about it – and then let Jill Stallard know. This is not whole story – but all there is room for, Councils or Health trusts and Authorities may hold shares in other military industries, we just haven't found out yet! You could help – without leaving your fireside. If you require more information, or are interesting in becoming more involved in this campaign, get in touch with Mary Jones or Jill Stallard.

How cute! - in preparation for the possibility of privatisation, our friends at Nuclear Electric are considering changing their name to Safeco! Fifteen other names in the running for the"friendly and dynamic" title include Britannia Electric, New Electric, British Energy, Genco and . . . wait for it. . . Envirogen. Not one of the fifteen names refer to the radioactive nature of the generation. Are they trying to hide something?I imagine readers of Heddwch may have some really good suggestions for names for Nuclear

Pili Pala was grieved to hear that the President of the Marshall Islands, islands already ravaged by US nuclear tests from 1946 to 1962, has offered one of the islands as an international dump for nuclear waste and warheads. The inhabitants of many Pacific islands have struggled for years to be nuclearfree, yet President Amata Kabua believes that the money raised by allowing others to dump there would pay for the rehabilitation of other radioactive islands. Many of the other islanders have cancers and other illnesses related

to radiation. One atoll is still used as a nuclear target by the US military.

Emily (age 7), a passionate member of the peace movement, and very close friend of Pili Pala's overheard a conversation about the Arms Trade. 'What's the Arms Trade?" asked Emily. "What do you think it might be? replied the teacher in Pili. "Well, "replied the wise little girl, "I think maybe it's when you give someone 10 pence and say "give me a hug!"".

Lester Brown of the Worldwatch Institute in Washington DC has isolated some of the important ingredients in creating sustainable societies. These include adequate foodstocks, basic health care, population planning, soil conservation and reforeststion. according to Brown, the Program would cost about \$150 billion annually for the next 20 years. This figure may seem exorbitant, but it is merely one sixth of the worldwide expenditure on arms.

The Goddess of language has smiled on the choice of Trawsfynydd as a location for the filming of the Grand Arthurian Legend. Enjoy this – the french for "camelot" means "trash; absolute rubbish; shoddy goods" (!).

More good news from our Ploughshares friends across the Atlantic - Father Carl Cabat is settling into state prison in North Dakota, having been sentenced to five years for having the audacity to take hammer and heart to a "minuteman" 3 nuclear missile silo. Carl entered missile silo "M-29" on April 1st, Good Friday, of this year. Dressed as a clown, he carried with him a hammer, bread, grape juice and a banner calling for an end to the arms race.
