Test ban update

he US moratorium on nuclear weapons tests technically finished on July 1st and as we went to press happily President Clinton is renewing it for at least another year. (However the Nevada site has already been prepared to conduct more underground tests.)

With Russia and France having declared that they will not be the first to re-start nuclear weapons tests, the future of nuclear testing now clearly depends upon the Clinton administration. The British government, in supporting testing is again isolated. There is even a suggestion that Britain may ask the

French to permit tests to develop new nuclear weapons in the Pacific!

President Clinton has been pressed to re-start nuclear weapons tests from three directions.

- the American military
- the nuclear weapons laboratories
- the British government.

We can't do much about the first two, but choiously it is our responsibility to do something about the third!

The Atomic Weapons Establishment, Cardiff: hot food to take-away?

The AWE, formerly the Royal Ordnance Factory, has been in Llanishen, the suburbs of Cardiff, since 1939. Between 1958 and 1960 the plant was converted to work with depleted uranium and beryllium and it became one of three plants producing the components for British nuclear weapons.

or the past 35 years the AWE has been discharging depleted or natural uranium, beryllium and a number of other toxic substances into the air and sewers of the city.

Uranium waste accumulates on site in the open air before it is despatched to Drigg in Cumbria. The majority of beryllium waste is re-processed on site. The AWE has a licence to store up to 50 kgs of natural and/or depleted uranium on site and it receives over 1000 kgs of beryllium every year.


AWE Cardiff's safety record is not known. There has never been a public enquiry into any aspect of operations at the site. It is shrouded in secrecy.

As reported in previous Heddwchs, a new factor has entered the safety equation. On 1 April 1993 all the AWEs were contractorised. The private company now running the plants is Hunting BRAE, a consortium comprising 3 companies — Hunting plc, Atomic Energy Authority Technology and Brown & Root.

Greenpeace has carried out an investigation into the past records of these companies. Hunting plc, although a major defence contractor, has no experience in managing or operating any nuclear plants. AEA Technology was formerly the UK Atomic Energy Authority which ran AWE Aldermaston until 1973, and was also responsible for the infamous 1957 Windscale fire (for example).

Brown & Root gained the majority of its nuclear expertise in America having designed and built at least two nuclear power plants in Texas.

The evidence that Greenpeace built up on Brown & Root clearly shows that the company has a dismal record in health, safety,

management and employment practices, as shown on BBC's *Panorama* in June 93.

Another worrying aspect of contractorisation is that Hunting BRAE is apparently immune to prosecution under any environmental, pollution or health & safety legislation.

Allowing a company with a dismal record on health & safety issues to run plants that work with some of the most deadly substances on this planet with no

regulatory control by anyone outside the plant, seems to me to be bordering on the insane.

There is no safe way of producing nuclear bombs. The whole process involves the discharge of radioactive and toxic materials into the environment and the production and accumulation of vast quantities of dangerous waste.

More information is needed on the site, for example the frequency of transport of radioactive and toxic materials into and off the site, its health and safety record and the hazards in the event of an accident.

AWE Cardiff, along with all the other AWEs, should be closed down and their energies put into containing the deadly legacy which has accumulated on site for over 40 years.

Nuclear power & nuclear weapons – the links

here is absolutely no connection" between nuclear power and nuclear weapons is the standard reply from the industry trade body, Nuclear Forum, when asked about the links. This reply is disingenuous as any study of the nuclear industry and its history quickly shows.

The links are, in fact, psychological, historical and factual. Psychologically the first the public was made aware of the awesome power of nuclear energy was after the bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki. Historically the first nuclear reactors in the UK, US, USSR (as was), France and China were built not to generate electricity but to produce plutonium for bombs. Factually it is impossible to operate any nuclear reactor without at the same time using or manufacturing materials that could be used for nuclear weapons.

Official bodies have not always been as untruthful as Nuclear Forum. In 1946 a US State Department report argued that unless a global authority was set up to forestall the growth of nuclear programmes proliferation of nuclear weapons would occur because "the development of atomic energy for peaceful purposes and... for bombs are in much of their course interdependent".

In the UK, Fig. 1 taken from an official HMSO Publication (1954) (reproduced on this page) clearly shows this interdependence. The shaded factories — Springfields, Capenhurst and Windscale (now Sellafield) — are still today central to the UK's nuclear power and weapons programmes.

Nevertheless, when the Queen opened Calder Hall at Windscale in October 1956 it was hailed as the world's first nuclear power station even though its primary purpose was the production of plutonium for the military. Chapelcross, Dumfries, also a military plutonium producer that generated electricity as a "bonus" came into operation in 1959.

Meanwhile the Government

had begun the Magnox reactor programme based on the Calder Hall design. In 1958 it asked the Electricity Board (CEGB) to modify the design of three power stations so that weapons grade plutonium could be obtained. In the event only Hinkley Point was so modified. Calculations show that it produced far more plutonium than would be expected of normal civil operation, especially in 1968-9.

Trawsfynydd may also have been used to generate weapons plutonium. The military prefer plutonium to be extracted from a reactor after a maximum of two years burn up so that it is still rich in the Pu 239 isotope. Economic electricity operation however, favours leaving the fuel in the reactor for up to five years. In the late 1960s the entire fuel inventory of Trawsfynydd was replaced at over 50% pa suggesting military use.

More evidence came to light at the Sizewell B Inquiry in the early 1980s. At the time the official line was that no plutonium produced in civil reactors had ever been used in military programmes either in the UK or elsewhere. CND presented evidence in Lord Hinton, former CEGB Chair, described this as "bloody lies" and said that to his knowledge plutonium from the Berkley and Bradwell reactors had been sent to the US. CND also calculated that at least 4 tonnes and possibly as much as 7 tonnes of plutonium from UK civil reactors had been exported to the US under the 1958 Mutual Defence Agreement. (In return for the plutonium the US supplied tritium and highly enriched uranium which the UK used respectively in its thermonuclear bombs and nuclear submarine propulsion reactors).

BNFL then astonished the Inquiry by admitting that its definition of 'military' and 'civil' plutonium was different to that assumed by others and did not refer to the origin of the plutonium but to the use to which it was put after reprocessing. Rods from civil and military reactors were co-processed on the same line at Sellafield and could in

principle be swapped.

Eventually in March 1986 Walter Marshall, CEGB Chair, admitted plutonium from civil reactors in the early years of operation had gone into the military stockpile. A few weeks later Mrs Thatcher changed the official line to no plutonium from civil reactors had been put to military use "during the period of this administration". She was "not able to answer for previous administrations".

This brief look at some aspects of the nuclear industry in the UK clearly demonstrates the links between nuclear power and nuclear weapons. A stockpile of over 30,000 kgs of plutonium from UK nuclear power reactors is held at Sellafield. The UK Government maintains an option on its legal right under the NPT to direct civil plutonium into military use, free of safeguards, should it ever wish to do so. 10 kgs of plutonium is sufficient to produce a nuclear weapon.

On the wider scene, any nation that develops nuclear power will have trained personnel, the technology and infrastructure from which there is only a short step to nuclear weapon technology. A nuclear power programme presupposes the existence in some form of material that can be used in bombs. Thus, in 1981 Israel destroyed Iraq's Osirak reactor shortly before it was complete fearing the production of plutonium for

weapons. (As has become clear since the end of the Gulf War this did not stop Iraq pursuing other, often clandestine, means of obtaining nuclear technology to help its weapons programme).

Similarly, in 1974 India exploded a "peaceful" nuclear device using plutonium (from a research reactor) reprocessed in the Tarapur plant built for its nuclear power industry. The reaction of Pakistan was immediate. It began to obtain via both legal and clandestine means the requisite technology so that by March 1987 General Zia was able to say "Pakistan can build a bomb whenever it wishes. Once you have acquired the technology... you can do whatever you like. You can use it for peaceful purposes only. You can also utilise it for military purposes".

Meanwhile, the US has successfully exploded at least two devices using reactor grade plutonium and in France all pretence of a separation between civil and military nuclear power has been dropped.

In 1984 France closed its last specifically military reactor, intending to rely on the Superphenix Fast Breeder to produce both electricity and high quality plutonium for bombs.

In short, nuclear power and nuclear weapons are intrinsically linked and it is impossible to separate them.


Thanks were given to our elected and appointed officers especially to our two retiring vice-chairs, Brian Jones and Ann Hall.

Book reviews

Maisie and Me: a Country Childhood in the 1920s by Stella Ashton

(Ex Libris Press, £3-95, available from the Peace Shop, Mackintosh Place, Cardiff)

In a world changing so rapidly it seems important to tap the memories of older people in order to keep a sense of continuity. This was the motivation behind Stella Ashton's charming recollection of her early life in rural Wiltshire. She has written a series of vivid snapshots of a country life in the 1920s regulated by the seasons and enlivened by the local characters. Particularly interesting are her descriptions of school in those days, the pranks she and her sister got up to

and the occasional tragedy that struck the community. She has recaptured the clarity and unsentimentality of childhood and the pleasant illustrations add to this impression.

Stella, a long time member of Llanishen CND Group in Cardiff, died in the autumn. Not many families have the chance to read and reread such memories but this book will be enjoyed by anyone who is fascinated by the recent past.

Hiroshima Day: August 6th 1993

Eisteddfod, Builth Wells

o commemorate the tragedy of Hiroshima on August 6th 1945, CND Cymru, in association with Cymdeithas y Cymod (Fellowship of Reconciliation), will be organis-ing an action on the Eisteddfod field for all supporters for a peaceful world.

This action will link the grotesque loss of life in Hiroshima and Nagasaki caused by nuclear explosions, the continuing loss of life due to nuclear testing and the build up of nuclear weapons, with the increased activity of the military establishment throughout the world and especially on our doorstep, Mynydd Epynt.

On Mynydd Epynt a £7 million 'village' was completed in 1990. This village, complete with mock church and graveyard, is used to 'train' soldiers to kill people in urban areas. This village is very similar to those shown on television where soldiers are killing civilians in the former Yugoslavia.

As a further action to highlight militarisation of our lands, a walk organised by 'Ramblers for Peace' will be held at Castlemartin in Pembrokeshire on Bank Holiday August 30 this summer.

Trawsfinished

Update on Nuclear Electric's attempt to prop up the discredited technology of producing electricity using nuclear power.

he management at Trawsfynydd Nuclear Power Station is still hoping to obtain a licence from the Nuclear Installations Inspectorate to restart electricity production from their flawed Magnox reactors. There is a proposal before Meirionydd District Council to give planning consent to Nuclear Electric to burn 'low level' nuclear waste at Trawsfynydd. Pressure is being exerted on the Council to withdraw their opposition to the proposal in order to avert a public inquiry. If consent is given for the incinerator then more radiation will be discharged into the air over North Wales and surrounding areas.

 That each of the four British Trident submarines will have the capabilities to cause 1,000 Hiroshimas' worth of damage?



The government's Defence Export Services Organisation is holding a huge arms bazaar – the 'Royal Navy and British Army Equipment Exhibition 1993' – in Aldershot from the 5th to the 10th of September. They expect about 20,00 visitors – mostly overseas government officials – to attend and inspect the weapons and services on offer.

We seem to have learnt nothing from recent history. While the Scott Enquiry into arms sales to Iraq continues, everyone acknowledges that a large part of the problem in Bosnia and Somalia is that there are just too many weapons; yet once again tax-payers money is being used to promote weapons sales!

I would like to ask you what your views are on the arms trade in general, and in particular:

- do you think the government should cancel the 1993 Exhibition organised by DESO?
- If the exhibition goes ahead, do you think the government should publish in advance the list of countries which have been invited to send representatives to the exhibition?

Dear Sir,

I am writing to you on behalf of Mordechai Vanunu, who – as you know – was illegally kidnapped by the Israeli Secret Service from Europe before being sentenced in March 1988 to 18 years imprisonment for treason, because he revealed details of the Israeli nuclear weapons programme to the international press.

I beleive that since then he has been held in solitary confinement, under video surveillance, under electric lights for 23 hours a day, with only a monthly one hour visit from his family (under tight surveillance).

This strikes me as a vindictive attempt to break Mordechai Vanunu's spirit. He acted from a strong belief that the affairs of state should be open to public discussion amongst the citizens who elect the government. The CIA already knew of your nuclear programme, and more details are becoming available of your collaboration with South Africa; in many ways all Vanunu did was to make public information which was already known by some and suspected by many.

I therefore strongly urge you to ask your government to reconsider both his sentence and the conditions of his imprisonment, and I hope that Vanunu will soon be released.
