confidence in their superiors is
worth a dozen which is made
to work under threat & fear.

of militarism after the war. Let
not a day pass or elapse untimed
until your freedom & liberty is secured
again.
Business not issued as well as
mosquito net. This is economy!
Read of a case of corn & beans
ploughed up to make a site for a
factory whereas the adjoining ground
could be of same use. But no.
That was a golf link at the
same time there's an economy
committee with a Colonel who gets
wore a year & a staff to devise
ways & means to defend the soldiers
of his nation.

5 Glorious morning: news of new time of ascent in Russia. Grand Duke Michael proclaimed Czar of Siberia. Another start - 12 C.O.s in charge of huts to render normal work of those who get a bath weekly! Night staff marched to breakfast.

There's shortage of men.^{1st} About 50 men are sent daily with cutters & wall(!) to cut grass along the roads & open spaces. Day parade. Rest in the afternoon. Sleep in bivouacs: rain come or so had to make for the hut huts-skeltes.

6 Breezy morning: Roger affine for leave owing to the death of his mother. His leave granted at last after 3 weeks anxious waiting. News that D.A. (Lord Rhuddes) is dead. Poor D.A. He seems to have been fairly

successful as Food Controller. He did as he wished - in豪ness.

204 men arrive for duty - are scrubbing the ~~offices~~ their afternoon. Take a stroll with the boys. Sleep in the bivouacs.

Rec. note from March & Jones from S.H.
7 Sunday.

Fine fresh morning: convoy today of 78 from 60 61 + 80 the 4 H. expected to arrive about 8 p.m. Rec note from Owen. Afternoon off: sudden gale blows: heavy showers; March does not turn up. Convoy late: arrives 8.45: working till 10.20. appears before O.P. the 6th m^o lost hill: warned no secrets.

8 Windy morning: Rec letter from V.J. Also invite McDavie Green the therapist.

Will he go? I shall not be surprised

9 Fine day. another convoy today.

Rec letters from Mab & Dai
Mab has finished her train & is going

from reaction. Did not know that Anna
was burnt for. Dai is alright.
Still in London.

Afternoon off. Convoy of 50 from 64 G.H.P.
Sgt. Adam leaves the Div & goes Med Stores

10 Wednesday.

Fine day: Cricket team leave
for Kavaburun accompanied by few
men. Wish I could go for a change.
Fairly busy this morning.
Feel unwell the last two days -
headache & pain in legs. Little better
this morning. Very hot day.

11 nice day: receive letter from Miss P.

Afternoon off: Troubled with boils
aching terribly fail to sleep.

12 Very hot day: Report sick: have boil
dressed & take medicine. Feel unwell
headache, pyrexia & pain in leg.

news was news favourable, as far as
it goes: activities in Albania.
Australian driven back; heavy
cannonade heard from here last
night indicating activity on the front.
Rec'd letters from C.M.L.

13 Feel unwell: attend dressing room
without better. Receive letter from
Anna, Mark & V.J.

14 Sunday. Leg very painful:
looks awful. Shall report sick
tomorrow again. Rec'd letter
from T. J. R. Jones has joined him
now. They are happy & lucky
chaps. Attend service: common
service at St. Padre spoke on
unofficial goodmornings or the
words - man eating out drink
who follow us this.

Very erratic; and as we remembered a previous lesson most interesting, judging from his remarks the health in the house of the worst type of men. The Church is jealous & refuses to acknowledge any party who claim to do good.

Thunder storm: as it look like rain slept in but did really fail to sleep long made an attack in close formation & so had to retreat to bivouac by camp fire. Letter from Rachel.

15 Two men admitted dying right over on b1 & the other on b2 by Draper appear to have been very ill -

knocked the air about till the O's front teeth could not understand him. He is gone this morning; I suppose it was a heat stroke or perhaps "heat wave stroke".

Report sick again admitted to C.B. Should have been 3 days ago: discharge foul, both sides. Rest all day by camp. Don't care for sister: have not seen M.D. Sister, training on nights - for available girl. What difference of nature between two sister! Thunderstorm in the evening slept fairly well.

16 In bivouac now up at 6, get by dressed

- by 500s before leaving day.
- M D sees me: giving blood treatment - fomentations.
- 17 Hotest day. Temp 101 in shade. Waas playing Sgt attended what foolishness no treatment given as medicine. Mental case dies from Malaria
- German offensive starts in the West - no gains. Re. P.C. from Harry Worts there.
- Another hot day: dry dressing. See C.O. Says I can carry on did not care how I was.
- See Jenkins & get lamblia. News Stan Davis calls to see me.
- Rumors of a big Convoy in a day or two. Shall be out by then I hope. Write to M.L. a short letter. Very hot day.
- 38 Coonin admitted.
- 19 Very hot day. Nothing of importance reported. Lowest at night by 11 H & lowest early - poor company half time. Convoy of 60 special vehicles.
- 20 Another hot day. Ask M.D. to be marked out. He is going to see the O.C. Rec. letter from Chas. V.J. & Annie. Chas says he is better. Two of the boys undergo an operation - all well. White & Meab & Roberts. Good news from the Western front, advances of 8 miles on 25 mile front 2000 prisoners 1200 guns.
21. Sunday: Am discharged from hospital. Rec letter & paper from Chas: attend Services (C.E) in evening: enjoy it too.

22 Busy day: Convoy D 66 in
the morning; Glorious 'day'; heat
intense. DMS inspection

23 Very hot day: afternoon off.
Visit sick: heavy thunderstorm
Rec. 2 letters from Cardiff.

24 Fresh morning. Rec letter from Mah
a from Mr L. & 1 from Mrs.
Mah. disappointed failed in history
with Mrs.

25 Very hot day. Rec letter from Bill Evans.
He is still in Palestine: expects to be sent
to a t. coy or Infantry. Does not like the
idea. It seems that there is a move
in the same direction in the country
again.

Hear that Roberts is likely to be
sent down the line with shell
shock for good.

Big fire about 9 p.m. in French Camp.

26 Very close morning. Fairly busy.
No letter this morning.

27 Hot day. No letters today. Fairly busy.
Mitchell admitted to 30 Gen Hosp.

Take a walk to YMCA. Write to Roberts

28 Another hot day. Fairly busy day.
No letters. Interrogated by May Anderson
in long session. Several admitted
today. Feel unwell myself.

Sunday: on duty by myself the afternoon
Write to C M L. & Miss J. Cardiff.

Hope to attend services tonight. It is one
of the links that bind me with the
rest of the past. O for that day when
we shall again return to our work!
Communion service: seem unreal; matter of
form; yet it was a reminder of the great
sacrifice & stimulus to the spiritual life.

28 Continued sermon on "I fulfill what is
left of the command of st." Better sermon than
I have listened to for some time.

Father announced that this is his last at
52nd. Much soft soap, which evidently claim
that he is ignorant of the state of affairs here
or that he was not sincere.

29 Roger goes to the Registry; Capt Martin
expecting a commission. This is quite a
rage these days. It's now likely to be sent
to S. Hill Coon including Speciebank. I
suppose I shall be amongst them; still
I leave it to him who has cared for &
protected me so far. He will see me thro.
off this afternoon. Rec parcel of cigs.
A paper from V.J. Poor girl makes every
effort to be of some help home. I am
afraid I am not so patient as
I should. O for a thankful heart!

30 Fresh winds blowing again today.

31 Fine day: O.C. inspected morning parade.
20 & 2 NCO's detailed to load ship. Capt Koon
leaves. Good luck to him; long to live
him though.

Rec letter from E. Jones, Roberts having
sent down the line with the ship. Storch
appears to be in bad shape & likely
to be sent home. I hope he will
evidently be well before we are within
the sound of guns. Does Roberts

I hope to see him before he goes.

Am busy this morning: all by myself.

Hear that J H Jones has been discharged from the Army. Good luck to him. I wish I could get out of it. I dream that I am wasting my life. Yet I trust all will be well in His hands. Write to L.

1 Aug Fine morning: Parade of specialists under training. It seems that all "A" men are to be transferred to Infantry, so my time to fight is at hand. I trust all will be well. My course of action is fairly clear. I have no reason to change my attitude but rather I am more convinced than ever.

I have little to hope from the military authorities as such. But I've been providentially kept so far & I am hopeful of the future for the same protection. When will this terrible war end? At present there is no sign.
