

The will of Jenkin Morris, yeoman, of Llanblethian, dated 10th July 1783.

To his brother Francis Morris of St. Hilary, his silver watch and best suit of clothes.

The remainder of his goods to his wife Mary Morris during the time of her widowhood. However, should she remarry then the remaining goods were to be divided equally between his wife and their daughter, Mary Morris.

In the Name of God Amen.

I Jenkin Morris of the Parish of Llanbethan and County of Glamorgan Yeoman, being sick and weak in Body, but being of sound and disposing Mind, Memory & Understanding (praise be to god) do make and ordain this my last will and Testament in Manner following, that is to say, I give and devise to my Brother Francis Morris of St. Helary my Silver Watch and my best Suit of Cloathes. I give & bequeath all the Rest, Residue and Remainder of my Estate both real and personal whatsoever, to my most loving Wife Mary Morris during the Time she continues unmarried, and immediately after her Intermarriage all that she shall then be possessed of both real and personal to be equally divided between my only Daughter Mary Morris and her Mother my said Wife Mary Morris, whom I also nominate and appoint sole Executrix of this my last will and Testament, hereby revoking all former Wills by me heretofore made and declaring this to be my last will and Testament, I set my hand and seal this Tenth Day of July 1703
