

Education The Challenge

The Victorians valued learning, but the majority of children received only a basic education. Few schools were free. For many, the only school was the Sunday school. Children who did go to school learned reading, writing and arithmetic, studied the Bible and memorised the catechism.¹ Children usually learned by rote. Paper was expensive so there were few books and only slates to write on. Lessons were in English, Welsh was restricted to Sunday schools.

Religion was an important issue in nineteenth-century education. The Church of England supported the National Schools in Chirk, Ruabon, Rhos and Wrexham. Nonconformists² sent their children to the British Schools, such as the one on Brook Street in Wrexham.

In 1847, the Government set up a Commission of Inquiry into the State of Education in Wales. The commissioners had many prejudices about the Welsh language and nonconformity.

"The scholars are very dirty and ragged, uncouth... and being altogether uncivilized, appear to require discipline even more than instruction."

The commissioners' report on the schools around Wrexham revealed a desperate situation: barely trained teachers and run-down ill-equipped schools. The report caused an outcry, but locally it was seen as a challenge. In Wrexham and Ruabon, new National Schools were opened and the local gentry paid for a Ragged School in Wrexham to provide free education for the poor.

¹ The catechism is a series of questions and answers, detailing the beliefs of the Christian church, which children learned by heart.

² Nonconformists, also known as Dissenters, included Christians such as Baptists, Methodists, and Presbyterians. They were known as nonconformists as they would not conform to the beliefs of the Church of England.
