

OPENING CEREMONY PERFORMER

DAFYDD EDWARDS is no stranger to the United States, having visited and appeared in concerts here over a period of thirty vears. His first visit in 1977, at the invitation of David Morgan, a cousin, to sing at the Columbus Gymanfa Ganu was but the beginning of a flood of concert and festival appearances across the U.S., visiting Oklahoma, Nebraska, Texas, New



Mexico, New York, California, the Dakotas, Oregon, Minnesota, Washington, both the state and the national capital, as well as Toronto, Vancouver and Victoria in Canada.

Those visits were as guest soloist with various choirs; as a member of "Parti Ceredigion" in the early 80s or, more recently, in company with daughters Menna, accompanist, and Gwawr, soprano.

Dafydd has also visited Australia on three occasions, travelling from east to west; appeared in concerts in Hong Kong, Singapore and Beijing; entertained on many cruise ships, including twice on the QE2, and visited many European countries. And, of course, he has been in great demand through the decades at home in Wales and in the UK


In addition to his fifty years of singing, Dafydd has been completely devoted, for sixty years, to taking care of the family beef and sheep farms at home in Ceredigion.

Ceredigion, in the mid 19th century, was the hub of a mass exodus to the U.S., and four Edwards brothers with their families, including at least thirty children and the widow and seven children of a fifth Edwards brother, left Wales to settle in Oak Hill in southern Ohio. Dafydd's great-great-great-grandfather is buried in Bethel cemetery in Oak Hill.

So it is little wonder that Dafydd feels a particular closeness and fondness for the U.S., and a special pride in returning to this his 3rd National Gymanfa at Columbus. He is looking forward to meeting as many of his relatives as possible and hopes that many will visit the festival in Columbus in September for a grand reunion.



THE SHUTTLE BUSES TO THE GYMANFA will leave

between 1:00 and 1:20pm. Advanced registration is required. The buses will return after the afternoon session for those who wish to return to the hotel. Please note that the intersession meal will be held at the Westin Hotel (NOT headquarters hotel) and the Westin is directly next to the Southern Theatre. The buses will leave the headquarters



hotel again at 6:30pm for those wishing to attend the evening session and will bring everyone back at the end of the closing ceremony. GETTING TO AND FROM THE COLUMBUS AIRPORT



COLUMBUS HAS ONE AIRPORT, code CMH. There are several ways to get from the airport to the Hyatt Regency. The taxi fare from the airport to the hotel is approximately \$30. The journey takes about 15-20 minutes. A pre-booked shuttle is available through Arch Express. The costs are \$20 plus tax each way for one passenger or \$15 plus tax per passenger each way for two or more passengers traveling together. Passengers can make reservations by phone, 614-252-2277, or on their website at www.archexpress.com. Travelers should mention the event, promo code "NAFOW", to receive the special convention rate. Shuttle location will be at ground transportation just outside of the baggage claim. Look for the signs that read PREARRANGED VEHICLES. The last option is using COTA (Central Ohio Transit Authority). The trip will take about 1 hour and cost \$2. You will need to change buses. For details specific to your arrival time, visit the COTA website http://www.cota.com. Your destination address is 350 N. HWYL INTERVIEWS FESTIVAL CHAIR

The following is an interview with Laura Gorun, chair of the Columbus, NAFOW 2015, festival.

FIRST OF ALL, LAURA, could you tell us a little about yourself?

I grew up in Akron, Ohio and came to Columbus to attend Capital University, where I got my degree in fine arts.

After working in financial services for many years, I left to make lovespoons and do volunteer work. My husband, John, and I live with the last of my three dogs, a little



mutt named "Tri" (Welsh for "three"). We live in Worthington (on the North edge of Columbus).

Could you tell us a little about the makeup of your festival committee?

I have a wonderful committee! We have, I think, a fantastic blend of experience and fresh perspectives, all with lots of enthusiasm and great ideas. We are so grateful for the very strong experience with the NAFOW and WNAA, in Stacy & Cheryl Evans, and Jeanne Jindra.

Then, we have Beth Ransopher, who has lots of great Columbus government connections and insight, has been leading the efforts on researching history of the Welsh in Columbus, and has been instrumental in tour planning.

Tegwyn Lantz has also been helping out with all areas of research, and bringing up endless creative and interesting ideas for us to consider. Teg and Beth have been working hard to help map out routes and talking points for the informal walking tours we plan to be offering in the mornings and one afternoon of the festival.

Jeff and Patti Jones have been full of interesting and creative ideas to consider, and they have contributed to historical research and helped engage local groups such as rugby clubs and local restaurants. Patti is very skilled with fiber arts, and will be doing some informal spinning demos at the NAFOW.

Pam Jones has also been lending her creativity, insight and careful eye to all of our plans. Stacy & Cheryl Evans, and Jeanne Jindra have been giving us invaluable support, offering the benefit of their extensive experiences with the NAFOW and the WNAA. We have been poring through the documentation from the 1998 festival, learning from, and re-using everything applicable and available.



We have, of course, been working closely with the Welsh Society of Central Ohio, the local host Society this year, to try to combine efforts, where possible, to the mutual benefit of both the NAFOW and WSCO.

Our biggest challenge may have been to decide what activities to include in the short time of the festival and how best to make additional information available to those who wish to get the most out of their visit to Columbus.

Laura, what's your connection to Wales?

My paternal grandfather grew up in Wales and moved to Ohio when he was 16. I can remember sitting on Grampa's lap, and he read me the Welsh saying from a tea towel, and sang "Ar Hyd y Nos" to me. He was always singing.

What do you find most exciting about holding the NAFOW in Columbus?

Wow - how can I even begin to answer that, with so many amazing performers and speakers lined up, along with all

that Columbus has to offer! But I suppose I would have to say that we're excited for people to see how the city of Columbus has changed and grown since the last time the festival came here (1998). Even we



locals have been impressed with the revival and development of downtown. We genuinely hope people explore and even book a little extra time before or after the festival to take in more of all the great things Columbus has to offer!

What are you hoping NAFOW attendees will experience in Columbus?

As much as they possibly can! Don't forget to schedule for the Thursday and Monday bus trips, too! But I think the icing on the cake would have to be the Gymanfa Ganu at the spectacular historic Southern Theatre. Considering the theater's wonderful, intimate, meticulously restored 19th century atmosphere and its world class acoustics, along with our wonderful NAFOW conductor, organist, and Welsh male voice choir all leading us, this will be an especially memorable Gymanfa Ganu. Why, I literally have goosebumps just thinking about it.

Laura, what else would you like to say to those people who are thinking about coming to Columbus NAFOW 2015? I say, don't miss it! Bring the family! Make a vacation of it!

Cymdeithas Instructor's Certificate in 1986. She organized Dawnswyr y Tract Cymreig, The Welsh Tract dancers, and led them from 1986 to 1992. Sian was a member of the Dawnswyr Mon display team in Anglesey that performed for six months in 1991. She frequently gives

demonstrations at many of the Celtic Festivals in the mid-Atlantic region and on her visits to Wales she has joined Welsh teams performing dances at various events. In 2009 she was a member of the U.S. team from Welsh Heritage Week that competed at the National Eisteddfod in Wales and was judged worthy of performing on the main stage.

OUR EISTEDDFOD – GETTING A NEW LOOK!

AS THE NAFOW (North American Festival of Wales) continues to evolve, so do its constituent components such as the Eisteddfod; this will be no exception in Columbus. Thus, in response to some general discussion and relevant "market research", we have condensed the schedule so that all competitions will take place on a single day - Saturday, September 5 - to help everyone involved (competitors, adjudicators, hosts, accompanist, spectators) free up time for other Festival activities. In a word... you're running out of excuses not to compete!

This year, we have a total of six competitions in singing and recitation, covering all imaginable bases. Recitation set pieces include: "Cofio" by Waldo Williams (Adult Recitation); "Y Sipsiwn" by Eifion Wyn (Welsh Learners); and "Welsh History" by R.S. Thomas (English Language). Once again, in addition to Hymn Singing and Solo Voice competitions, the David G. Morris Memorial Competition (Solo Voice/Semi-Professional) will offer the opportunity for a generous cash scholarship for travel to compete in the 2016 National Eisteddfod of Wales. Hymn Singing requires that you sing one hymn entirely in Welsh; the

other singing competitions require two pieces, at least one of which must be in Welsh.

You can enter as many competitions as you like, with the sole exception that you cannot compete in both Solo Voice and the David G. Morris Competition. While your entry must be received by August 20, 2015, certainly contact us at any time if you have any questions at all about the Eisteddfod or its competitions (email: eisteddfod@nafow.org; phone: 412-215-9161).

The NAFOW Eisteddfod has been a mainstay of our Festival since Alan Upshall founded it in 1994. In competing, you will benefit from the insights and input of professional-caliber adjudicators, so think of it as a handson workshop to help continue developing your skills!

I want to thank fellow Eisteddfod Committee members Myfanwy Bajaj and David Llewelyn for their considerable help to date, as well as Gerri Baker Parry for her assistance with the forms and to Megan Williams for her ongoing input and support. Many thanks also go out to our generous competition sponsors, who are noted on the forms.

So what's to wait for, then...? We'll see you onstage in Columbus!
